Welcome and Overview

Hello! This is going to be a great class. It's going to be a lot of work, but by the end of the quarter, you should have a very good sense of historical debates about the self and the subject.

Papers

You will write two papers, with the option of the second paper being an extension and elaboration for the first with the possibility of future publication. The papers should be no shorter than five pages (Garamond or Times New Roman or something similar, double space, 1 inch margins). They should have a clear argument about the themes we discuss in class, either using your own data or engaging in a theoretical or methodological critique. Papers should be e-mailed to me no later than 11:59 pm of the day they're due. Late papers will be deducted one letter grade each day.

Readings, Presentations, and Participation

Each week we're going to read just one book. I'll provide some supplementary stuff you can also look at, but just the book is required. I know it's hard to read all of a book, and we can talk about strategies to skim but the conversation really will go best if we read the books as seriously as we can and come with notes, ready to discuss them. I'd strongly suggest taking reading notes that you can then refer back to in class. I'll e-mail reading suggestions about a week before each class.

I understand some people have an easier or harder time talking in class. Here's my quick rule: say at least two things. Also if you're talking too much (and I'm definitely one of those people), sometimes it's important to let there be a little silence. Not everyone talks right after someone else finishes talking (even if, well, I do that all the time: this is what growing up in a huge family does to you.)
